Ethos

Our school's ethos contributes effectively to pastoral care by:

We encourage our children to think positively about themselves and to accept their own uniqueness. Our school provides opportunities for the children to feel valued and important by creating an awareness of the positive contribution they can make towards school and the community.

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Through our Pastoral Care we aim to develop our children's responsibility for their safety in a variety of situations within and outside the school environment. We develop this through the curriculum and highlight in appropriate policies, i.e. Safeguarding, Behaviour and Anti-Bullying.

The Governing Body hold overall responsibility for the development and implementation of the Pastoral Care Policy. The Senior Leadership Team are responsible for ensuring that Pastoral Care is forefront in the school's agenda and will monitor and evaluate its effectiveness.
